Stories of Connectional Giving

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Neighbor to Neighbor, Kimball Avenue UMC, Waterloo

Three children from the neighborhood apartments were coming to the Kimball Avenue United Methodist Church after school, so members of the Waterloo congregation started providing snacks and talking with them.

As the months progressed, the church created a lending library of books for the kids to check out and read at home. After a while, the children started to bring some of their friends. The church expanded their ministry to include a movie day, Bible study, lunch/snacks, and life-skills training.

One day the kids brought an additional eleven friends with them. "We were not prepared," said pastor Lilian Gallo Seagren, "and we knew then that we definitely needed to design a formalized program to meet their needs." Their new ministry, Neighbor to Neighbor, was born.

The project engages the congregation in relationships with children and youth. Thanks to a Matthew 25 grant from the Northeast District (supported by apportionments) this ministry will grow to provide racial/cultural education, mentoring, and family activities. Plans call for involving neighborhood adults as well as children in this family-based ministry.



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
